New Car Seat Law for Maryland

Beginning June 30th 2008, Maryland children will be required to ride in a car seat or booster seat until their 8th birthday, unless they weigh at least 65 pounds or are at least 4 feet 9 inches tall. The car or booster seat should be appropriate for the child's age, weight and height. Maryland law still requires that children less than 16 years of age wear a seatbelt once they are beyond use of the booster seat.

Highlighting Local Child Fatality Review Teams

The **Baltimore County Child Death Review Team** focuses much of its preventive activities on the reduction of infant deaths. On May 20, 2008, they hosted an “Infant Sleep Safety Summit” at Franklin Square Hospital Center. Participants, including public health, public safety, health care, childcare, education and social services professionals, reviewed infant fatality data and brainstormed ways to build a “Community Sleep Safety Net” to help save the lives of healthy babies in Baltimore County. The summit was a great success; recommendations from the professionals in attendance will be included in a final report that will be released later this summer. The summit received press in The Avenue News, as well as on WBAL-TV and WBAL radio.

In addition to this most recent event, the Baltimore County team has worked to create and test documents used by Franklin Square Hospital for their mandatory discharge sleep safety and abusive head trauma counseling; the sleep safety documents are also used by home visiting nurses and social services. Members of the team have also been working to provide lectures to child care providers, school nurses and paramedics on prevention issues. In April, the team hosted British visitors who were observing CDR teams in the USA in preparation for establishing CDR teams in the United Kingdom. Several members of the team attended the CDC’s SUIDI National Training Academy in Boston in May 2007.

Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act

Congress has completed work on H.R. 4040, the Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act, and the conference report is expected to be passed by Congress imminently. The AAP played a key role in producing a strong bill that contains numerous new child safety provisions. The final version of H.R. 4040 contains the following key provisions:

Ban on Lead in Children’s Products: The bill will ban all but trace amounts of lead in toys and children’s products sold in the U.S., regardless of their nation of manufacture; **Pre-Marketing Testing and Safety Certification of Toys and Children’s Products:** For the first time ever, the bill will

require mandatory, independent, pre-market third-party safety testing and certification of all toys and children’s products;

Reauthorization of the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC): The CPSC has not been reauthorized since 1992. H.R. 4040 renews the agency for 5 years and gives it significant budget increases, which will allow the agency to hire hundreds more staff and pursue the many mandates issued by Congress; **Database of Consumer Complaints;** **Ban on Export of Volatile Products;** **Tracking Labels for Children’s Products;** **Improved Product Registration Forms:** Manufacturers must provide special product registration forms with every infant or toddler durable product.
